RACES?

Many of the LVARC members check into the Monday Night ARES/RACES Net but do they really understand the difference between these two organizations? They are different. Since we have many new members to the club, these differences will be reviewed.

RACES is an acronym for Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services and is administrated by Lehigh County office of Emergency Management. After World War II, local emergency management agencies included amateur radio services into their civil emergency plans. This remains the case today. In order to participate in a RACES or county emergency management event, one must be registered with the county as a licensed amateur radio operator who is interested in being a member of the EMA team. Recently, we have learned that one must also have a NIMS certificate (by October, 2006). RACES events include a natural or man-made disaster such as a flood or a threat to the country (as in 9-11). Liability for participants is the responsibility of the county during a RACES event.

When registered as an amateur radio operator with RACES, one performs ONLY in that role. If one has a different skill such as medical or radiologic training, he may register and operate in that capacity. In other words, if only registered for *communications*, one should NOT assume other roles while participating.

ARES, which stands for **A**mateur **R**adio **E**mergency **S**ervices, on the other hand is **not** connected with the county's emergency management office. ARES is recognized by the ARRL, however, one need not be a member of the ARRL to participate in an ARES activity. ARES activities include local events such as parades walk-a-thons, marathons and bike-a-thons. Liability for participants in an ARES activity is the responsibility of the club and/or the sponsoring organization.

Many clubs (like the LVARC) hold simultaneous RACES/ARES drills and this is acceptable but keep in mind that they are indeed two separate entities.





Plain Language is the Best Practice!

(Although "10 codes" are <u>never</u> used by ham radio operators and "Q" signals are <u>never</u> used on VHF/UHF (unless clarification is <u>required</u>), this article is interesting regarding the importance of clear, concise communications. --- ed.)

WASHINGTON - In Washington, DC, if a police officer says 10-50, he or she is talking about a car accident. Across the line in Montgomery County, Maryland, 10-50 means an officer needs help. And that's the way it is across much of the country, 10-codes used in one jurisdiction are not the same as

those used in another. That's why it is important that responders and incident managers use common terminology. There simply is no room for misunderstanding in an emergency situation.

The use of plain language in emergency response is matter of public safety, especially the safety of first responders and those affected by the incident. It is critical that all local responders, as well as those coming into the impacted area from other jurisdictions and other states as well as the federal government, know and utilize commonly established operational structures, terminology, policies and procedures. This is what NIMS and the Incident Command System (ICS) are all about - achieving interoperability across agencies, jurisdictions and disciplines.

The use of common terminology is about the ability of area commanders, state and local EOC personnel, federal operational coordinators, and responders to communicate clearly with each other and effectively coordinate response activities, no matter what the size, scope or complexity of the incident. The ability of responders from different jurisdictions and different disciplines to work together depends greatly on their ability to communicate with each other.

It is required that plain English be used for multi-agency, multi-jurisdiction and multi-discipline events, such as major disasters and exercises. Beginning in the fiscal year that starts on Oct. 1, 2006, federal preparedness grant funding is contingent on the use of plain English in incidents requiring assistance from responders from other agencies, jurisdictions and functional disciplines.

While the NIMS Integration Center doesn't require plain English for internal operations, we strongly encourage it. We believe it is important to practice everyday terminology and procedures that will need to be used in emergency incidents and disasters. NIMS implementation is a long-term effort and it's probably not possible to persuade everyone to change ingrained habits overnight. But we do hope that over time, everyone will understand the important of using common terminology, that is, plain English, every day.

(Rule of thumb: When in doubt, do NOT be cryptic with your messages!! Give messages in clear concise language -- ed.)

If you wish to help with this event, please contact Mark (AK3M). Your help is essential if we are to have a successful activity!!






LVRR/LVARC

"The number three had carried a grim peoples connotation among from primeval times. Always, in all cultures, three was associated with danger or distress. The Boy Scout Handbook teaches that three rocks piled on top of each other was a frontiersman's sign for danger. Three smoke puffs was the Indian distress signal. A hunter fired three shots when in need of aid. In the International Morse radio code, the symbol **SOS** had been adopted as the easy-to-send, impossible-to-mistake international distress signal on the high seas. Contrary to a legend popular among laymen, SOS had no other meaning such as "Save Our Ship" or "Save Our Souls."

The course is easy and you need only answer a simple 25-question test to become certified and it can all be done online! There is NO FEE.

History of the FCC



The United States Federal Communications Commission, created by an act of Congress on 19 June 1934, merged the administrative responsibilities for regulating broadcasting and wired communications under the rubric of one agency. Created during "The New Deal" with the blessings of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the commission was given broad latitude to establish "a rapid, efficient, Nation-wide, and world-wide wire and radio communication service." On 11 July 1934 seven commissioners and 233 federal employees began the task of merging rules and procedures from the Federal Radio Commission, the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Postmaster General into one agency. The agency was organized into three divisions: Broadcast, Telegraph, and Telephone.


I have found a supplier for embroidered **golf shirts**. We will be using the company Ernst Light in Oley, PA. They have provided me with sample embroidery, and three sample shirts. I have chosen a Guilden golf shirt, gray with navy accents. The shirt is 7oz, 100% cotton. Much heavier than the paper thin shirts that we have had in the past, and I think the price is very good. We did not have to pay a set up fee, and that makes all the difference.

The embroidery sample that they provided me has a higher stitch count than what we had, and that makes the letters seem more finely focused and bolder on the shirt.

Prices are \$14.00 for S-XL and \$16.00 for XXL.

I will be taking email orders for the shirts up until the 15th of March, and will try to get the first order delivered for the April meeting. I am asking that club members that order shirts have their money at the April meeting.
