



#### "My Two Cents" ... de Mark (AK3M)



A recent editorial under the "My Two Cents" caption focused on the National Traffic System" (NTS) and made it seem like the NTS no longer existed, and therefore there was no need to have anyone trained in handling formal written ARRL type NTS messages.

As the editorial stated the Internet and free long distance phone plans have diminished the need to use the NTS as it had been up trough the mid-nineties, but the fact is that the NTS is still in existence and does still handle formal written traffic, although a lot less than years ago due to the reasons previously cited.

The editorial asks" How many times has our local net handled traffic?" and then continues "I have not heard actual NTS traffic in many years". I suggest the editor listen to other repeaters and nets and he may hear some of it. There was actually incoming NTS traffic listed on the District 2 ARES net last month, and I have heard incoming NTS formal traffic passed on both the Carbon and Schuylkill weekly nets in June and July.

I don't disagree with the underlying theme of the editorial in that the NTS doesn't function to the same degree or handle the same amount of traffic it did ten or fifteen years ago, but I do strongly disagree with the conclusion it seems to arrive at in that we don't need to be trained in the proper handling of formal "written" traffic.

There is a need to be able to pass "written" traffic over radio, be it the standard ARRL radiogram format or the FEMA ICS-213 format. If you were to put ten people up on a stage in front of you standing side by side, and whisper a statement to the first person on the left, and ask that person to whisper it to the next person, and on down the line, by the time it gets to the last person it will bear no resemblance to the original statement.

Just think what would happen if the originator of the original oral message was the local Lehigh EMA director and he was asking the state EOC to send two Hazmat teams into his county. By the time it passed as an oral message through five or six repeaters on it's way to Harrisburg, it may get translated as "I need to move my team to Hazleton"...Sound far fetched??? It happens. A formally written and transmitted message doesn't get changed that way.

I am a big proponent of Winlink, and, because email now has become a way of life for us and our served agencies we need to embrace new methods of written "traffic" by utilizing email over radio with mediums like Winlink, where we can actually attach photos and other documents - it can be typed directly by the EMA director and go direct to the recipient faster than the NTS and without any additional Amateur Radio stations relaying in between.

But then again, lessons should have been learned from hurricanes Katrina and Rita - the EOC's and their PC's were wiped out, so even Winlink email from an EOC wasn't always an option. And, I would hate to have been that local EMA director down in Mississippi asking for the two hazmat teams while the state EOC thought he was just letting them know he was moving his location....We do need to be trained in handling "written" traffic – be it ARRL radiograms or NIMS IC-213!!!

And, even within Winlink, most Amateur stations utilizing it still use the old NTS message format – so "Yes" - there should be training in handling "formal written traffic"





#### LV Ham Becomes Silent Key



#### **"Looking Up"** -- Insights from "Old 807"

When I was a boy on the farm, it was great seeing an aeroplane (wings) or an airship (dirigible) grace the sky. Every night there was a radio report from these airships on prime time news. Radio was an asset to these big balloons.


Ferdinand Von Zeppelin built the **Los Angeles** for the U.S. as part of war reparations (WW1). Italy built the **ROMA** for the U.S. These two were hydrogen filled airships. The U.S. built the **Akron**, **Macon** and **Shenandoah**. The Shenandoah flew into a storm in 1922 and disintegrated. The Roma blew up over Langley Field, VA., in 1922. The Akron went out of service in 1933, Macon out of service in 1935. The German **Graf Zeppelin** flew around the world in 21 days. The German **Hindenburg** made 10 round trips to the U.S. but in 1937, it burned as it was landing --- 35 dead and 62 survivors. That was the final chapter of the airships.

It was a cost effective way to move cargo and people are still talking about blimp cargo transport. Shenandoah, Akron and Macon were helium filled airships. Helium is only found in the U.S. and is mostly used in metal welding.

Goodyear still flies the blimps but all that is left of the golden age of lighter than aircraft are postage stamps. Very expensive and highly collectible, if you can afford them.

If only they had ham radio aboard the Hindenburg -- what an E-Bay item that QSL would be!













#### Antenna Problems? Read on!

#### **USS New York**

It was built with 24 tons of scrap steel from the World Trade Center

It is the fifth in a new class of warship - designed for missions that include special operations against terrorists. It will carry a crew of 360 sailors and 700 combat-ready Marines to be delivered ashore by helicopters and assault craft.



Steel from the World Trade Center was melted down in a foundry in Amite, LA to cast the ship's bow section. When it was poured into the molds on Sept. 9, 2003, "those big rough steelworkers treated it with total reverence," recalled Navy Capt. Kevin Wensing, who was there. "It was a spiritual moment for everybody there."

Junior Chavers, foundry operations manager, said that when the trade center steel first arrived, he touched it with his hand and the "hair on my neck stood up." "It had a big meaning to it for all of us," he said. "They knocked us down. They can't keep us down. We're going to be back"

The ship's motto? "Never Forget" ----- from an email from Frank (W3FTU)

#### SET Scheduled for October, 2007 - de Bob (WB3W)

On Saturday, October 27, 2007, the Eastern Pennsylvania Section District 2 ARES group will be conducting a joint SET. The SET, or Simulated Emergency Test, is an annual ARRL sponsored event for ARES groups to test their emergency preparedness and readiness, and is normally held in October.

The EPA District 2 encompasses the six counties of Berks, Carbon, Lehigh, Monroe, Northampton and Schuylkill, and the EC's from all six of the counties have agreed that it would be beneficial to get operators from all the counties to participate together, and we may also have some activity from a couple of the District 1 counties, just south of our district.

The actual script is still being written, but will be centered around a weather event that will not have the kind of wide spread or catastrophic consequences of hurricanes Rita or Katrina, but will still probably have Category 1 or 2 winds, with wind damage to some assets and flooding damage to others. They may even be some spotty tornado activity.

The SET will utilize the 147.255 repeater in Jim Thorpe as the main resource/tactical net frequency, although there will also be nets on local repeaters, and we will also utilize HF on the Eastern Pennsylvania RACES frequency of 3897.50 and we expect to have 6-8 Winlink stations on both VHF and HF.

The exercise will last approximately three hours, although the actual start and stop time have yet to be determined. There will be deployment to local/county EOC's, to served agencies like the Red Cross, and various schools used as shelters. But, since it is a "simulated" emergency the deployments will also be simulated, so operators can participate in the net and can simulate the deployment from the comfort of their Ham Shack.

When natural disasters or other man made disasters occur, they don't necessarily know local town or county geographical boundaries, so this could be a beneficial exercise, and we hope as many of the operators in the six counties will participate. And we know not everyone may be able to participate the full three hours, but if they can even put in just thirty minutes or so, they are still strongly urged to join in for that time they can.

As plans are developed further, announcements will be made on the local weekly VHF nets, including start and stop times.

During the second week of August, I had the opportunity to accompany my work partner on a road trip to Vermont. Having never been to Vermont, it was a great way to get away for a day and squeeze in some mobile ham radio action. It must be said that my partner on the ambulance is Matt KB3NMQ. Once the plans were made for the trip, we also decided to stop off in Newington. Connecticut along the way and pay a visit to the ARRL HQ.

If you believe only half of what you read, and even less if it is on the world wide web of misinformation. then you may think that ARRL would be like anywhere else in the world. A great write up on their page, with many a welcome and exciting catch



phrase all designed by some marketing guru that is being paid to make everything look better than it ever could become. Okay, so I'm pessimistic. That's a good thing! If you always expect the worst, you are never disappointed, and are always either satisfied or surprised. At this point you may wonder what my response was to the in-person visit to the ARRL HQ.

Matt pulled the mighty Pontiac Bonneville into the parking lot, and found an appropriate place to dock. We were amazed by the antenna farm, and immediately started taking pictures of the lot, HQ, and of course of each other posed next to the Bonneville. The Bonneville is key in this trip because we had mounted a Side-Kick Screwdriver HF antenna to the trunk using three gigantic magnets. The antenna resembled a mortar tube, and I'm sure more than one motorist decided against tailgating for fear of the profile of the HF antenna.



We ambled up to the entrance to the HQ building and noted that we were standing in the Diamond Terrace. First off, it is not as impressive as the artist's rendition in the monthly QST. It is taking shape, and will need more donors to bring the area to life. We did locate Bob WB3JSZ's brick in the terrace, so it was nice to find a familiar call sign. We walked around the outside of the building, and made note of a monument to amateurs that died in the line of duty.

Proceeding inside of the lobby, the guest is greeted by portraits of the current and past presidents of the ARRL and then into a small gift, book, and exhibit area. For those wishing to take a tour, simply signing up with the receptionist is all that is needed. We were then greeted by an ARRL staff member and given a tour of the HQ building. The highlights were: seeing the ARRL

Lab, QSL Bureau, QST Editing Staff, and VE Coordination Area. The tour then proceeded to the W1AW building that is located across the parking lot. After the tour ended, we were welcomed to operate the W1AW station. It was nice to sit down in a professional studio, and use professional equipment to make contacts. Although the bands were dead into the U.S., I did manage a couple of Italian contacts on 20-meter voice. I wondered if the W1AW call sign is meaningful in other parts of the world?
