


The October, 2011 LVARC meeting will be held on October 4, 2011 at the TriClover Fire Company at 7:30 pm.



Bookshelf

By Alfred Gruenke, KB3JPP Life and Death of Inanimate Objects By Dr. August Polinske



In a departure from previous practice, we are taking this portion of the Newsletter and devoting it to the review of a scientific work by the renowned Professor Emeritus of Metaphysical Relationships at the University of Lower Wolhynia, Dr. August Polinske. This work should be required reading for anyone with time on their hands and an intellectual bent, since many of us have had similar personal experiences. It will prove to be interesting and informative, especially in areas of limited contact with the outer world.

This masterfully researched and documented three-volume work is the culmination of a life time of research by Dr. Polinske. The references itself covers 135 pages, in six languages. In it, he tries to explain a phenomenon noticed by all of us, but usually discarded by our pre-programmed minds as impossible.

The question Dr. Polinske tries to answer is, do inanimate objects have the ability to reproduce, and do they die?

Contrary to conventional thought, Dr. Poliske's answer is a resounding YES!

Consider this. You place a couple of pennies in the drawer of your desk or in an opaque jar, and in a very short time, the numbers increase. So the question is, where do the new coins come from? Dr. Polinske quickly discarded the idea of division, alá amoebas, because the dates on the coins varied. Also, it was noted that one coin does not multiply. There must be at least two coins for this to occur.

Dr. Polinske tried a couple of techniques to observe this phenomena. Since the program had rather low budget, even more so since the devaluation of the Wolhenian Zlapf, a couple of graduate students would sneak up to a drawer or jar, yank it open, and observe the proceedings. This had dismal results. There were an increase in the number of coins, but no one was caught "in the act".

Though not supported by empirical evidence, the keen mind of Dr. Polinske has formed conclusions to explain what is occurring. Simply put, coins, (and other lowvalue objects such as metal coat hangers and cheap buttons) have the ability to reproduce. This happens only in the dark, away from prying eyes. Somehow, by means of another yet-to-be-explained phenomena, they "know" when observed.

It should be noted that Dr. Polinske has gone to dozens of countries in his research.

In the course of his travels, Dr. Polinske discovered a unique sub-culture, with adherents in every country of the globe. These are Amateur Radio Operators, a group of individuals with a flair for anything technical, especially if it has even remote relevance to radio communication.

These persons, or "hams" as they refer to themselves, have a trait that attracted the attention of the good doctor. They all have "junk boxes"; sometimes actual boxes, more often a drawer in their house, that is filled with the remnants of their avocation. Screws, nuts, knobs, transistors, circuit boards, partially completed construction projects, sometimes even vacuum tubes. It's obvious that the process is the same as for low value coins, except with hams the time span is in the decades, resulting in junk boxes growing to gargantuan size, often occupying entire rooms, or wings of homes, sometimes displacing the inhabitants!

Surprisingly, in spite of the inherently curious nature of these persons, the cause of such growth is never questioned. It "just gets bigger". Also unique to hams is the passion they have for their junk boxes. This is not mere "stuff", its "their" stuff.

A catalyst of such growth could be a cultural activity known as a "hamfest", but results are inconclusive.

Similar to larger denomination coins, nothing of value ever reproduces. In the almost 100 years of amateur radio activity, there has never been one case of a radio or test instrument that has reproduced itself, even if two identical units are placed side by side in a dark storage closet and left untouched for years! When confronted, most of the ham population attest to this fact.

Unique to junk boxes is that if a component is taken and installed in something and becomes useful, the reproduction process ceases. Dr. Polinske has no explanation.

At the other end of the birth-to-death continuum, Dr. Polinske noted the dark side of inanimate objects. Cannibalism.

The good Doctor observed what many of us experience every day. The disappearance of socks. Socks come in pairs (twins), yet only one disappears. Has anyone ever found a sock previously "lost"? The answer is, of course, no. Dr. Polinske has clear evidence that one sock is eaten by its twin, for reasons unknown. Only twins of socks are eaten. A single sock, who has already consumed its twin, is never consumed by its peers. It survives virtually forever, until its owner, despaired over the loss of its twin, throws it out.


The eating of one sock by another may occur suddenly, leading to one sock's disappearance, or slowly, as evidenced by holes appearing in a sock. Haven't you ever wondered what happens to the material which had been in a hole, if not consumed? What other conclusions can one draw?

However, as a clear sign that Dr Polinske is a true scientist and has no preconceived opinions, it should be noted that not all unexplained disappearances are metaphysical. The disappearance of valued equipment is something all hams have experienced. With quivering lips and teary eyes, they relate how equipment or components that have been silently sitting on a shelf, untouched but not unloved since the Sputnik era – are suddenly gone.

Through sophisticated statistical analysis, Dr. Polinske and his team have noted that most disappearances occur shortly after a variation of the Summer Solstice festival, during another ham-bonding cultural activity known as "Field day", when many hams are absent from their homes for a couple of days.

Intense investigation, included enhanced interrogation of family members, especially spouses, have revealed the truth. Non-hams often grasp the opportunity to rid the household of these items, referring to them as "just more junk", and secretly throw them out, with no regard to the loving bonds between these items and the ham. Intense negotiations involving boxes of chocolate and vacations in exotic locales sometimes reverse such disappearances, but results are never certain. Dr. Polinske has these occurrences on his follow-up to-do list, to be used in his next publication, to be released within the decade. It's sure to be another page-turner!

Dr Polinske does us all a great service identifying beliefs that have placed our minds in a straight jacket, unable or unwilling to address issues outside our "comfort zone". This monumental work of scientific achievement will go a long way to releasing us from these bonds.
