



Australia on 5 Watts and a Wire

It was a cold and rainy February evening in suburban Wescosville, Pennsylvania. It was "tween" time, the time between the Super Bowl and the opening of baseball Spring Training. This is when physical and mental activity in general slow down. February is, in general, a pretty useless month. Other than a few exceptions, it's usually cold, wet, and miserable. The month just doesn't have much going for it. For years I've been advocating going from January directly to March, skipping February entirely. However, my voice of reason has been a mere cry in the wilderness, drowned out by the forces of darkness and disparagement.

It was early Friday evening and I was home recovering from surgery. My recovery left me with a lot of time to spend on my favorite leisure activity, globe trotting with my Elecraft K1. I fired up my ICOM IC-746PRO and the K1, Ham Radio Deluxe and QRZ.com on the computer. Then I went hunting for DX on 20 meters. Utilizing two receivers really makes a difference when Dxing; monitor one QSO while searching with the other. My antenna is a mere 52 ft. G5RV Junior 25 feet above the ground.

Up and down the band, I would listen to a station, check if I had worked that country or state, and then skip to another. This went on for some time. Then I heard it! A VK prefix! Any prefix that starts with the letter V (other than VE or VA) will get my attention since it's sure to be a pretty exotic DX. I listened for a while to verify the call, "VK2GWK". I checked the call on QRZ.com. Yup, that's Australia! I'd already worked VK land with 100 Watts, so I thought I'd give it a go with the K1, QRP.

After finishing his QSO he called, "CQ, CQ de VK2GWK", and I responded. He came back, "KB3???". I did a fist pump and repeated my call. Again he sent "KB3???". I repeated my call about three or four times, after which he had my call correct. My RST was a mere 339, but, as they say, a slight ripple in the cosmic ether is better than no ripple at all. His RST was a very respectable 579

VK2GWK is Henk Tobbe, New South Wales, Australia. It's a few miles up the coast from Sidney and 9.776 miles from Wescosville, or 1,995 miles per Watt. Not bad. A few Watts go a long way! I intend to apply for another 1,000 miles per Watt award. Henk has a rather sophisticated website which allowed me to download an electronic QSL card. It's nice, but I'd rather have a real card in my hand. Call me old fashioned. Besides, I don't know if an electronic card is valid for any awards.

I don't know if I was just lucky or whether the long-promised sun spots are coming back, but by QRP QSO's have been increasing lately. So far, I have confirmed QRP QSO's with 38 states and 62 countries. I've had QSO's with Oman, Nigeria, and Kiritimati, but this one is the most memorable. Just think of it, Australia, with only five Watts and a wire!

I celebrated in style at the Stoned Crab, up the street from my home. Beefeater martini, very dry, very cold, with olives. Shaken, not stirred. Life is good.

To CW or Not to CW - de lke (N3lK)

While learning Morse code is no longer required in order to pass a amateur radio exam many hams prefer this mode for general operating. If you have never tried this mode you might wonder why anyone would want to bother with it!

First of all, let me tell you back when I first was licensed all I wanted to do was work phone (AM in those days). Just did not seem reasonable why I had to learn Morse! However in those days the FCC mandated a knowledge of Morse for all classes of Amateur license, so we all learned the CODE!

After receiving the license I began to assemble a AM phone station. It would be a 40 watt transmitter with Heising modulation. It worked great except for the fact that mine was the weakest signal on 75 meters! No matter what I could conjure, 40 watts (actually about 15 watts) just could not cut it on phone. Consequently I was forced to move down to the hated Morse code.

After a very short time I realized that even with a low power transmitter I could actually talk to hams all over the globe. Now it became a thrill to operate! One night I talked to a ham in Oregon, all the way on the other side of the USA and we chatted for over half an hour and became great friends, exchanging not only QSL cards but letters and photos. This was why I got into ham radio. As time went on my code speed gradually approached 25 wpm and I could copy signals in my head; so to me it was just as good as talking.

After about a year of working 80 meters my Elmer (Doc Dibelle W3HTS) talked me into converting my homebrew 80 meter rig to operate 40 meters. My third contact was with a fellow in Italy! Within days stations in Europe, Africa and South America were in my log. Now I was really convinced that Morse code would be my mode.

This was in the mid 50's when the sun spots were the best in many cycles and the higher bands were hopping. At age 15 my financial situation was sort of bleak, however that summer Mr. Keller asked me to work for him in his Orchard and enough money was put away to purchase a "World Radio Globe Scout kit". After a week of furious kit building it was ready to put on the air. Yes, it did work phone and I worked a lot of 10 and 15 meter phone (still low level modulation) and low power but on those bands it did not matter. Strange thing though, Most of the harder to work DX was on CW! Hence I gravitated back to that mode. One particular contact on 15 meters was with PY7ASN (Percy) He sent me a Great QSL card on which was a drawing of Chess men. I was an avid chess player and wondered about this. It was not long till I heard him on 15 and called, finding he had excellent command of English I inquired about his chess man QSL and found he was a grand master chess champ. So like a fool! I challenged him to a game on the air. Needless to say it was a disaster but he seemed so happy that he sent me long letter asking if I would like to belong to a chess on the air group? This was a new aspect of the hobby to me, I found myself playing games with hams who spoke almost no English but the chess shorthand was recognized by all. After school and relocating to the Western USA I lost touch with this group and found they disbanded in the mid 70's. But it was great fun and worth the effort on cw.

Today one of my favorite activities is low power (QRP) operating. On cw with 5 watts over 120 countries have been worked.

While working the QRP CW frequencies lately many young hams are active on cw. One, Molly a 16 year old YL from Washington has been on 20 meters about a year. She learned code so she could work more stations with low power. A very interesting young lady to chat with. Frequently she works an other teen (Brian) in Ohio and they seem to really have fun. It was surprising to listen to a bunch of these QRPers having a round table on cw, most of them were under 20 years of age, so guess cw will live on for awhile yet.

Over the years CW has been my favorite mode of operating, yes I work some phone (SSB and FM) and have even worked PSK 31, RTTY and SSTV but Morse is preferred above all others.

Now, will knowing code make you a superior ham? No but it will give you another option and if you are oriented towards emergency communications it can be very handy to know as it will get through with very simple gear and low power when all else fails.

Hope this spurs your interest in learning Morse code and in a future article I will tell you how to go about learning Morse.


